Matters arising from the August management meeting:

1. The committee has agreed to go ahead with a quote from Solargain for a 5.72kWh solar panel system. It is a smaller system than we originally considered but we would only receive a feed-in tariff below 5kWh. As Henry says, why give Western Power free electricity. The position will be revisited once we can financially look at installing batteries. 2. Over the last 12 months Henry has obtained grants worth nearly \$30,000 for our Shed.

3. The project to pave the area overlooking the garden area has been given the go-ahead.

4. Henry Is currently seeking quotes for installing decking at the back of the Shed overlooking the garden, to give us more entertaining space.5. The Shed's Annual General Meeting will be held on the 26th of September. There is still time to nominate for the management committee. Nominations need to be to lan by the 12th of September.

6. Moving the workshop dust extractor outside the Shed is a significant project as the new external shed will need to house both the extractor and the water filtration system. The committee will be looking for a member to supervise the project.

7. The tidy up in the workshop and meeting room is ongoing. Surplus equipment will be disposed of.

8. We are waiting for changes to our licence agreement with the City so that we can make a start on planning for the community garden.9. We have a new member Nigel Cobran this month. Please make him

welcome when you see him at the Shed. 10. The Roleystone Market is on Sunday the 15th of September and a

request for volunteers will be sent out soon.

The excerpts ranged from *What a Wonderful World* to *Swan Lake* to the *Jupiter Suite* from Holst's Planets. There was also one from Mendelsshon's *Midsummer Night Dream*.

Ian plays for the Classic Sounds Orchestra which must keep him busy with practices. He tells me he plays for four different musical groups, ranging from the classical orchestra to a brass band.
